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Lee leads Brewers' offensive barrage against Cubs

Slugger slams pair of home runs in win

CHICAGO

The Milwaukee Brewers have become so reliant on Carlos Lee driving in big runs this season that it is scary to think where they would be without him.

Lee did his thing again Thursday afternoon, cracking two more homers and boosting his runs batted

in total to 72, tops in the majors. But the big slugger did not have to go it alone this time.

Lee had a lot of help as the Brewers pounded 16 hits, including 10 off future Hall of Famer Greg Maddux, in a 10-6 romp over the Chicago Cubs that prevented a three-game sweep at Wrigley Field.

Particularly productive were the Nos. 6-9 hitters in the starting lineup—Damian Miller, Geoff Jenkins, J.J. Hardy and pitcher Chris Ca-

puano—who combined to go 10 for 17 (.588) with four doubles, a home run and six runs batted in.

"This is the way we know these guys can be," said Lee, a lock to represent the Brewers in the All-Star Game. "We know Jenkins is a great hitter. You don't just stop hitting overnight. Jenkins is a proven big-league hitter. He's just going

through tough times."

Miller, Jenkins and Hardy have fought particular demons throughout the season, each seeking some semblance of offensive consistency. For Miller, the Wisconsin native who signed on for three years, it has been hitting with runners in scoring position.

When Miller stepped to the plate in the fifth inning with two on and two out, he was batting .185 with runners in scoring position, including a woeful .053 (1 for 19) mark with two down. Having scored three runs the previous inning to knot the score

at 5-5, the Cubs opted to intentionally walk Lyle Overbay to get to Miller.

"The smart thing to do was to walk Lyle," said Miller, ignoring his career .350 average against Maddux. "I hadn't had a hit with a runner in scoring position since, like, April 1."

Quickly down in the count, 0-2, Miller took an outside sinker the other way to right field for an RBI single that put the Brewers on top to stay. For good measure, he added a two-out homer in the seventh off Sergio Mitre—again, on a 0-2 pitch—that ignited a three-run rally.

Teams: The field consists of 21 teams of nine riders each, for a total of 189 riders.



Six-time Tour de France winner Lance Armstrong wants to make his final race one to remember

CHALLANS, FRANCE

This ride will be different because it's his last—and so will Lance Armstrong. For a change, he'll savor the sights along the Tour de France route and even the strategy meetings with his Discovery Channel team. Just don't expect his heightened awareness to distract him from focusing on winning his seventh Tour in a row.

"I know there will be key moments," he said Thursday, 48 hours before the start, "and I want to savor that because next year I'll be on the other side of the table with all the old guys."

"The rides through villages, the dinners with guys who have become my best friends, even the team meetings ... all of that I will never experience again. But it has sunk in and I'm doing a pretty good job of focusing. I feel excited and obligated to win."

Armstrong begins his farewell on Saturday with a 11.8-mile sprint from Fromentine to Noirmoutier-en-l'Île. On July 24, he will ride around the Champs-Elysees for the final time as a professional athlete.

Speaking at a news conference and flanked by team director Johan Bruyneel, Armstrong looked and sound-

ed relaxed. It was in stark contrast to last year, when he acknowledged he felt the burden of history. Armstrong's sixth win put him one ahead of Eddy Merckx, Miguel Indurain, Bernard Hinault and Jacques Anquetil.

"I was nervous last year ... I had the impression I was up against ... not a demon ... but something else," he said. "All the greats had never won six times and something told me it was not possible, like a higher reason."

But it was possible. "Winning last year was like a huge weight removed," he said.

The 33-year-old Armstrong acknowledged he wasn't performing up to his standard earlier in the year. He looked sluggish and weary at the Paris-Nice race in March and the Tour de Georgia in April.

"The older you get the higher the risk you have. I can't argue with my birth certificate. I had doubts but I never panicked that I would not be ready in time," he said. "The fact is that it's my last Tour and I have to find specific motivation within myself."

Armstrong says the design of this year's course makes it harder to judge than previous years. The opening in-

Control woes, lackluster offense plague Legion in loss

Beloit scores four runs in first two innings

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JANESVILLE

Janesville's American Legion baseball team continued its roller-coaster season Thursday night.

Cody Williams fired a complete-game six-hitter, and Chris Tudor knocked in a pair of runs as visiting Beloit ended Janesville's four-game winning streak with a 6-2 win at Riverside Park.

Janesville (9-5) trailed 4-0 after two innings and could not recover. "We were very flat tonight," Janesville coach Matt Lipke said. "I thought Lance (Muzzillo) would throw strikes for us and make them put the ball in play, but he had trouble with his control."

"Offensively, we didn't get a lot of good swings in," Lipke added. "We

played well on Saturday and Sunday at the Barrington tournament, and in beating Oregon on Tuesday, but tonight the effort just wasn't there."

Beloit scored two runs in the first off Muzzillo (0-2). Morgan Pounds drew a leadoff walk and scored on Tudor's double. Tudor scored on a wild pitch, followed by Kris Beaumont's RBI groundout.

Beloit added two more runs in the second. Tudor knocked in a run with a sacrifice fly, and Nate Tilley scored on Matt Sweeney's throwing error at third. Beloit scored four runs off Muzzillo on just two hits.

"Lance has to throw strikes. That's all there is to it," Lipke said. "He's not going to throw the ball by anybody, but when he throws strikes he can be effective."

"I didn't want to use Joe (Bachmeyer) that early, but you can't give up four walks in one inning," he added.

Bachmeyer, who will be a senior at Janesville Parker, threw well in relief. The righty allowed only two runs on three hits through six innings.

Beloit made it 5-0 in the fourth before Janesville finally scored in its half of the inning. Justin Hopper doubled with one out and scored on Jared Bakke's RBI single. Hopper's double was Janesville's first hit of the game as Williams kept the home team in check.

Janesville scored again in the fifth on John Pohlman's RBI grounder that drove in Sean Stubbendick. Hopper and Bakke each finished with two hits, but Janesville struck out seven times against Williams.

"I don't think he was throwing that hard, but he had us swinging at

some bad pitches out of the strike zone," Lipke said of Williams. "We have to be more selective at the plate."

Janesville will begin play tonight in the Mike Grogan Benefit Tournament, with games scheduled against the two Janesville Junior Legion teams, as well as Plover.

"I'm going to let the younger kids play for the most part this weekend," Lipke said. "I'll get an opportunity to get a good look at some kids that haven't played a whole lot."
