

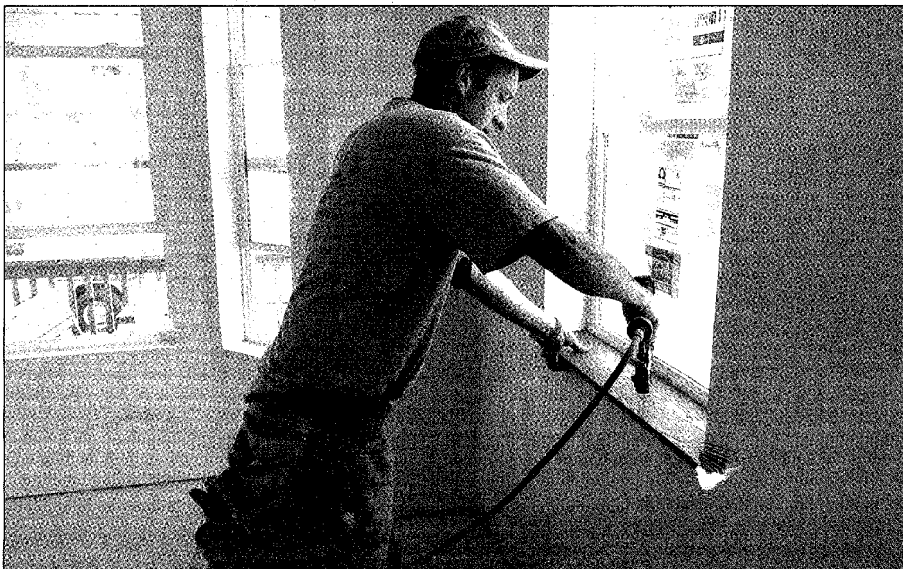

### Local businesses provide time, supplies in Habitat for Humanity Builders Blitz

Phoebe Scott looked around her new house June 9 and smiled. Outside, landscapers laid down sod while other workers hammered and sawed in the backyard.

Flipping through a photo album, Scott said she was amazed with what

had happened with her home over the last five days.

"You think about all these people from all over coming here to work on your house and you've never met them before," she said.

Scott's home — and nine others in Milwaukee's Metcalfe Park neighborhood — was built in a little less than a week as part of Habitat for Humanity's Home Builders Blitz 2006, which constructed nearly 450 homes in 130 communities around the country June 5 through 9.

## Grade 9 could move to MFHS

### District may reduce number of secondary schools; considers 4K

Students at Menomonee Falls High School could get some company in a few years if the first part of the district's grade reconfiguration plan makes it onto the ballot in November.

At a School Board workshop June 19, Superintendent Keith Marty recommended the district reduce its number of secondary schools from three to two by bringing ninth-graders into the high school and making North Junior High the district's lone middle school.

North now serves students in eighth and ninth grades, while Thomas Jefferson Middle School houses students in grades 6 and 7.

The plan also calls for the establishment of a 4-year-old kindergarten program by fall 2007 and a reduction in the size of Ben Franklin Elementary School, which is now the district's largest with about 850 students.

"I think that this is a configuration with the right type of facilities and the right type of programs to bring us into the future," Marty said.

District officials said they hope to put a referendum on the ballot in November that would cover the costs of necessary renovations and

Eleven members of the Metropolitan Builders Association participated in the project, including Bartelt Filo and Carmel Builders in Menomonee Falls.

"Whenever you can give back to an individual or the community, there's a sense of pride beyond what you get in daily life," said Sandy Borkovetz, Bartelt Filo's marketing director.

**'A reverse hurricane'**

Bartelt Filo workers put in long hours to finish Scott's house. The walls and roof were put together by the end of the day Monday, and builders installed windows and siding Tuesday. Workers continued the frantic pace the rest of the week, and by late Friday morning, they were putting the finishing touches on the home.

Borkovetz said it was interesting to see the house come together so quickly.

"It's kind of like a reverse hurricane," she said.

Matt Swanger, the site's project manager, said he wasn't sure if a house could be put together in less than a week.

"I started off being scared to death whether we'd be able to pull this off," Swanger said. "The nice part about it is I didn't hear one person complain."

Bartelt Filo co-owner Rick Filo said his company was proud to participate in the project and credited everyone involved for their hard work.

"It's just a good effort from everybody," Filo said. "They dug in; they did the job. That, as a business owner, I'm very proud of."

Carmel Builders president Tom Weiher said he also was proud of his company's effort during the Home Builders Blitz.

Building inspectors gave the final approval to Carmel's home for Shenita Horton and her two sons at about 10 a.m. Friday.

"It's been such a great privilege to be a part of it because it's such a great thing," Weiher said.

Weiher said he was glad when the construction finally started because he and his wife Barbara, Carmel's vice president, had spent the better part of a year working with contractors and other companies to organize and plan the massive project.

Builders Association, said more than 500 companies and individuals donated money, material and labor to the Home Builders Blitz. The association, which has members in Milwaukee, Waukesha, Washington, Jefferson and Ozaukee counties, recruited electricians, roofers, flooring companies, landscapers and carpenters to work with the builders.

"Once we kind of let everyone know what the project was, the response was overwhelming in every aspect," Siewert said.

More than a dozen companies from Menomonee Falls donated to the Blitz, including Malkin's Carpets and Radiant Electric Heat.

Malkin's Carpets owner Marty Schallock said he was interested in the project as soon as he was contacted by the MBA.

"It really piqued our curiosity as (to) how we could help and how we could get involved," Schallock said.

Malkin's installed carpeting, vinyl flooring and laminate flooring at three homes, and Schallock was quick to credit the other vendors and individuals who contributed.

"The generosity of all the people involved in the project is just tremendous," Schallock said.

Radiant Electric Heat donated and installed programmable thermostats in all 10 homes.

"It says a great thing about these individuals, about this part of the country," Schallock said.

didn't go unnoticed by Habitat for Humanity Chief Executive Officer Jonathan Reckford, who visited the neighborhood on the final day of the Blitz.

"I thought it was exciting," said Reckford, who visited two communities — Milwaukee and Detroit — during the project. "We were just encouraged by all the work."

"The thing that has been great is that the builders have had such a great time doing this."

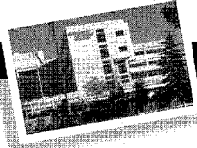
Weier agreed, saying his company would be glad to participate again.
